# Environmental Justice and Social Equity Bay Plan Amendment



## Goal:

*Amend the San Francisco Bay Plan to incorporate principles of environmental justice and social equity into the planning, design, and permitting of shoreline projects in and along the San Francisco Bay*

# What is SB1000?

- Environmental Justice Element in local government General Plans
  - IF: if there is a “disadvantaged” community
  - WHEN: adoption or revision of two or more elements concurrently on or after 1/1/18
  - HOW: stand alone or integrated




# SB1000

- Objectives of EJ Element:
  - Reduce health risks in DACs
    - Air quality
    - Public facilities
    - Food access
    - Safe and sanitary homes
    - Physical activity
  - Engagement in decision-making process
  - Prioritize programs and improvements that address the needs of DACs



# Jurupa Valley



- EJ Element in Jurupa Area Plan
  - Meaningful Public Input and Capacity Building, Land Use and the Environment, Mobility and Active Living, Healthy and Affordable Housing
- Demographics
  - Low-income
  - Majority Latino
  - Urban
- Community Engagement
  - CBOs

# Jurupa Valley



- Setting
  - Poor air quality (land-use patterns), discriminating state tax allocation policies
- Other policy areas addressing EJ
  - Land Use, Circulation, Multipurpose Open Space, Safety, Noise, Housing, Air Quality, Hazards

# National City

- Health and EJ Element in General Plan
  - Meaningful and Effective Participation, Air Quality, Physical Activity, Healthy Foods, Access to Health Care, Contaminants in the Home
- Demographics
  - Majority Hispanic or Latino
  - Low-income
  - Suburban
- Community Engagement
  - City Council, CBOs



# National City



- Setting:
  - Lack of public facilities, hazardous sites, poor air and water quality
- Other policy areas addressing EJ
  - Land Use, Circulation, Safety, Open Space and Agriculture, Education and Public Participation

# Richmond

- Community Healthy and Wellness Element in General Plan
  - Improved access to parks, recreation, and open space; expanded access to healthy foods and nutrition choices, improved access to medical services, safe and convenient public transit, quality affordable housing, expanded economic activity, complete neighborhoods, improved safety, improved environmental quality, green and sustainable development, leadership development
- Demographics
  - Ethnically and linguistically diverse



# Richmond



- Community Engagement
  - Advisory Committee
- Setting
  - Poor air quality, poor maintenance of public facilities, lack of healthy food options, limited emergency services, lack of walkability, violent crimes in low-income areas, other forms of pollution (water, soil, noise)
